A Writer's Book of Beats

Introduction

Dialogue beats are small actions or gestures that replace (or enhance) dialogue tags. Instead of writing "she said angrily," you can show anger with a beat: "She clenched her jaw."

This resource organizes over 300 beats by body part and action area, giving you quick inspiration to make dialogue more vivid, immersive, and true to life.

As I say in my free guide, "The Science of Story," beats transform scenes of talking heads to scenes of action. Compare the examples below:

Tags Vs. Beats

A **tag** denotes a speaker (Gertie said). A **beat** is a line of action that either precedes or follows dialogue and implicitly denotes the speaker.

Tag: "I don't know," Gertie said.

Beat: Gertie wiped her tears with the back of her

hand. "I don't know."

Tag: "What do you expect?" Jeno asked.

Beat: "What do you expect?" The corners of Jeno's

mouth twitched.

Although you should use more beats than tags in your dialogue, you want to be careful not to go overboard with them. Not every, "said" should be replaced with a line of action.

Additionally, you can use tags other than "said." I'm aware of the camp of editors and writers that argue that only "said" should be used, as opposed to tags such as "observed," "speculated," "theorized," "argued," and "conceded." They argue that "said" disappears in the background while the other tags are too obtrusive.

I and others believe, however, that the repeated and exclusive use of "said" becomes monotonous and distracting. You must do what you think is best when it comes to using tags.

Regardless of this disagreement over tags, everyone agrees that beats should be used in place of most tags because they break up the monotony and add details to the scene, enriching the story for your readers.

Brows

- She furrowed her brow.
- She lifted a brow.
- She arched a brow.
- She waggled her brows.

Eyes

- She widened her eyes.
